PERSONAL, SOCIAL AND EMOTIONAL DEVELOPMENT

- Work as part of a class, taking turns and sharing fairly.
- Dress and undress independently and manage their own personal hygiene.

At home you can:

- Play games with your child to encourage turn taking.
- Encourage your child to get dressed independently doing up zips and buttons.
- © Dress up as their favourite character.

PROBLEM SOLVING, REASONING AND NUMERACY

- Select the correct numeral to represent 1-9 objects.
- In practical activities and discussions, begin to use the vocabulary involved in adding and subtraction.
- Find one more or less than a given number up to 10.

At home you can:

- Count objects at home and ask your child to write the matching number. Relate to numbers in rhymes.
- Make up games with your child like snakes and ladders which involve counting on.

PHYSICAL DEVELOPMENT

- Use a range of small and large equipment.
- Recognise the importance of keeping healthy, and those things which contribute to this.

At home you can:

- Take your child to the park to explore the equipment or take a ball to play games.
- Encourage your child to make healthy choices in food and stay active by playing with your child outside.

COMMUNICATION, LANGUAGE AND

LITERACY

- Listen with enjoyment, and respond to stories, songs and other music, rhymes and poems. Hear and say sounds in words in the order in which they occur.
- Use writing as a means of recording and communicating.

At home you can:

- © Choose some of the stories we're reading from your local library.
- © Sound out words with your child to help them with their reading and writing.
- © Encourage your child to write about any visits you make to a museum etc.

KNOWLEDGE AND UNDERSTANDING OF THE WORLD

- Use simple tools and techniques competently and appropriately.
- Construct with a purpose using a variety of resources.
- Find out about, objects and events they observe through asking questions.

At home you can:

- © Practise cutting and sticking different materials, e.g. making story puppets.
- © Use household junk to make models.
- Sisit museums, children's adventure playgrounds and talk about the visit and what they can see.

CREATIVE DEVELOPMENT

- Respond in a variety of ways to what they see, hear, smell, touch and feel.
- Create constructions, collages, painting and drawings.
- Introduce a storyline or narrative into their play.
- At home you can:
 - Talk to your child about what they can see on their way to school and other places they visit.
 - © Use paint, chalk, glue, fabrics, wool and other materials to create a picture.
 - Act out stories with your child e.g. The Three Billy Goats Gruff
